It has specific relevance to a growing number of occupations and professions, in early childhood education, child care, and family studies. Graduates may find employment in a variety of governmental and non-governmental agencies dealing with childcare services or human service-oriented professions. Positions may include early learning and child care centre personnel, supervisors and caregivers, family-home visitors, family and community support facilitators, or staff specializing in programs for the developmentally delayed or for children with special learning needs.
